Guidance and good practice

Diabetes care planning

A Diabetes Care Plan template is being developed with care home providers, local health and social care teams, and supporting professionals, for use in all residential and nursing care homes across Leicester, Leicestershire, and Rutland (LLR).

A questionnaire will help gather vital information about the current practices related to diabetes care, and to help better understand what support is required for care homes and their residents in LLR.

The aims of creating an LLR-wide Diabetes Care Plan Template are to:

- Help improve the quality of diabetes care for care home residents in LLR and align it better to local and national guidance.
- Provide better advice to carers and residents about how to manage diabetes, particularly in care homes.
- Reduce hospital admissions and care events resulting from diabetes-related incidents/problems in LLR.

Nursing home equipment requests for bladder screening and syringe drivers

Due to inconsistencies across the service, it has been recommended that LPT Community Nursing services will no longer loan bladder scanners and syringe drivers to nursing homes. Community nursing services are not commissioned to provide care for patients in nursing homes. As of 1 August 2024, LPT Community

Nursing Services will no longer accept any referrals from nursing homes to provide syringe drivers, bladder scanner equipment or bladder scanning services.

Section 117 – LLR Joint Policy and Practice Guidance

At time of hospital admission some providers may approach ward staff to ask if support needs to be continued whilst in the hospital. Ward staff must get agreement from the ICB (via Midlands and Lancs CSU) and local authority through the allocated Social Worker or the Mental Health Hospital Team (whoever is funding the package of care) before confirming with the provider that support continues whilst the individual is in hospital. Invoices will not be paid if approval has not been agreed before providers start support in hospital.

Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) vaccinations

Background

Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) is a common virus that can cause coughs and colds in winter. It's an infectious disease of the airways and lungs and causes symptoms like a cold, including:

- cough
- sore throat
- sneezing
- a runny or blocked nose

It can also make you become wheezy or short of breath and lead to pneumonia and other life-threatening conditions. RSV infects up to 90% of children in their first 2 years of life, and frequently reinfects older children and adults. It's an infection that is common in young children but is most serious for small babies and for older people.

There is no specific treatment, and most infections will get better by themselves. Every year thousands of older adults need hospital care for RSV, and some of them will die. RSV can be more severe in people with medical conditions such as heart or lung disease or a weakened immune system.

It's transmitted by large droplets, and by secretions from contact with an infected person. Details on IPC measures can be found at NHS England » National infection prevention and control

Vaccination

Everyone turning 75 years old on or after the 1 September 2024 will be offered a single dose of RSV vaccine. Those aged 75 to 79 will be eligible. This is because older adults are more at risk of serious complications from RSV. A single dose of vaccine will help to boost protection as individuals reach an age group at highest risk of serious RSV infection. Unlike the flu vaccine, the RSV vaccine is not repeated every year.

The RSV vaccine may be offered at the same time as the shingles or pneumococcal vaccine, which is safe to do and can reduce the number of appointments needed.

RSV vaccine isn't normally arranged to be given at the same appointment as your COVID-19 or flu vaccines. However, in certain clinical circumstances, your doctor or nurse can safely offer them at the same time.

A separate programme is being rolled out for pregnant women.

UK Covid-19 Inquiry: pandemic stories sought

The Care Associations in the East Midlands are joining with the Care Association Alliance to encourage everyone in the care sector to share their pandemic stories, via the UK Covid-19 Inquiry's Every Story Matters campaign.

The Covid-19 pandemic had an unprecedented impact on those working in and drawing on adult social care services. Every story does matter. Sharing our

experiences – be that from staff or recipients of care - will help shape the understanding of what happened and help to bring about some positive change.

The Inquiry's public hearings for their investigation into the care sector, will begin in summer 2025.
