Setting the Scene for

LEAP into Writing

Following the success of 'Putting the Wow into Writing', a new cohort of Reception Teachers enthusiastically enrolled to become action researchers within their own school, working with their own children. Their aim was to improve the writing provision for their young 4 and 5 year olds and to make writing 'irresistible'. These teachers were eager to implement change and to evaluate the impact on the children. Auditing their own starting points this group of forward thinking teachers met to be introduced to new ideas, and to work with likeminded people. Exploring new 'hooks for learning' and discussing their findings they set off to introduce new innovation into their curriculums.

Keeping in touch through a 'google community' there began a sharing of ideas, ranging from a small change in the continuous provision to aliens landing from outer space.

At each session these motivated teachers shared learning and development through photographs, film, work and of course, plenty of talk and discussion. New thoughts and considerations were introduced: how might we use the outdoors or the arts to support writing, how might parents and families be involved, what about the local community? We thought big!! We thought let's

help children LEAP into Writing!

Evaluating the wider impact

- I led a whole school staff meeting and governors meeting which has inspired others in school
- I have better links with the community and use these to support opportunities for writing
- I have used IT more in school to support children's writing
- All my school are now using green screening
- The rest of the school are so impressed with what we are doing in the early years and I am so passionate about it
- I have now got the Year 1 teacher using inspirational provocations
- After being observed by the Head Teacher and Y1 teacher, they are now making changes to the writing provision in Y1
- Parents and the wider family and friends!! I involve them much more now
- The children are so enthusiastic, they have written to the head, bursar and to the other classes. Now everyone is involved
- This project has given me back my confidence!
- My continuous provision is so different! I have implemented so many of the wonderful ideas

- This project has helped me to get a new job! They were inspired



The Library Mouse sparked a great deal of independent reading and writing.



We visited the local library and wrote letters to say thank you. Some children wrote a recount for the school newsletter.

Our role play became a library. Children issued membership cards, sorted books into categories and enjoyed reading.

A small door appeared in our 'library'. A letter explained that we now had our own library mouse in the classroom.



Each day the children loved checking for new letters from Molly Mouse and replying to them. They wrote letters, made books and even organised a birthday party for her.



CHARACTER DESCRIPTIONS

Nature!

Following our nature topic and as part of Forest Schools, our children have turned into mini 'eco warriors' this year.

They have loved learning about minibeasts, plants, pond wildlife and life cycles and this has had an impact on their independent learning.



We visited local ponds to do some wildlife spotting. We saw several sets of swans, and when we looked more closely we realised that the females were sitting on nests, complete with eggs. This prompted the children to want to create and write signs to protect the swans and their eggs.

Unfortunately, on our walk we also saw lots of rubbish floating in the ponds. This sparked a very big discussion about how we can look after our environment and why it is important to throw our rubbish away. This resulted in us making posters that we later displayed around the rest of the school to teach the other children about rubbish.



We then used the Chatterpix app to pretend to be the pond wildlife. The different animals, frogs, swans and moorhens, thanked the community for caring for their homes and looking after their young.



Rainforests




Exploration

We explored the topic of rainforests by building a small world rainforest. We used herb pots, wooden slices and felt. The children has access to water sprayers and rain makers. We read non fiction books and explored the painting 'Tiger in a Tropical Storm'.





Drama

During Welly Wednesday we used our imagination to visit the rainforest. We packed our backpacks, got on a boat and set sail. When we 'arrived' we entered the rainforest (our nature area) and explored our surroundings. The children then drew and listed what they could see. They saw leopards, tigers, sloths, parrots, monkeys and even river dolphins.



Writing Challenge

After reading 'The Tiger who came to tea' we received a letter from the zoo. Their tiger had escaped for the day, and upon return had an awful belly ache. But we knew what he had been doing! We researched tigers and wrote facts about them including their diet. We then wrote a letter back to the zoo explaining that he had been eating all the wrong things. A live web cam from a zoo was kept on the interactive whiteboard which had the children captivated. Some boys made new enclosure designs for the zoo using construction.

Aliens visited our school! They left a message for the children from Bob, the Man on the Moon.




The children had to use iPads to read the special QR messages from the aliens to find out what Bob wanted them to do.






The children came up with their own writing opportunities, writing posters, labels, letters, adventure stories and more!




We wrote a letter back to the aliens asking them to collect the writing for Bob. We tied the letter to some balloons and launched them into space.



We also took the opportunity to try some green screening- the children loved it and added their own captions.





Water Writing at Glenfield Primary School

The idea behind our inspirational writing point was something quite basic: water. We decided to have a water day and introduced the activities.



The first activity was to stimulate talk for writing - 'What is in the ice?' The children were excited to look at the ice and watch what was to emerge as the ice melted. We encouraged this as an (unofficial) competition to see who could write down the right answer. The children seemed keen on this activity.



The second activity was making ice lollies and the children enjoyed reading the instructions to make their own ice lollies. Those who were able were encouraged to make their own instructions the following week.



The third activity was wax resist writing. The children practised their tricky words on the paper and asked a friend to read them. They loved the idea of the 'magic writing' appearing as the paint and water was brushed over the top. We then enhanced this idea with water pictures and secret message writing.



Outside, we used the water idea for lots of independent writing opportunities such as:

- Looking at toys trapped in the ice and writing down what we could see.
- Practising our handwriting with buckets and water.
- Mixing water and chalk for writing, drawing and mark making.




We had a big research day finding out about lots of different sea creatures. We watched a clip of David Attenborough talking about dolphins, used the internet and books and made notes on our clipboards. This made the children feel very important. I then set up a research table with note books for the children to continue their investigations.

We used Pie Corbett's story telling techniques to learn the story of the 3 clever rainbow fish. We then turned the story into a big book for a shared write and the children illustrated it. This allowed the children to see me writing for a purpose. The children then went on to write their own stories in zig zag books.



We made some beautiful junk model sea creatures which inspired the children to make their own models. They were encouraged to write labels to go with them.



After we had finished with our story I left it in the book corner for the children to read. I also added zig zag books to the continuous provision which really inspired independent writing!




Following on from our topic on jungles, the children had developed an interest in the Amazon Rainforest. They gathered information at home to share with each other and presented it in a range of ways including posters, pictures and books. One of the children wrote 'oxygen' which sparked lots of conversation about why trees are so important. Over the course of a week we had moved from jungles to how we can help our environment. We went on to learn about recycling and how paper is recycled. We gathered the paper wasted by the school for just one day, which filled two bin bags (we have a small school) and wondered how many trees we had to cut down to make this much paper. We thought we could have a go at recycling our own paper!





Recycling

After we had made our paper we challenged the children to write instructions so that the other children in school could make their own recycled paper and save some trees!

We shredded the paper we had saved and put it in buckets of water to soak. The children had a great time squishing the mushy paper in the tough spot, we added food colouring and food essence to the mix. The children had lots to talk about; texture, colour, smell, and the activity supported their large muscle development and helped to strengthen their hands. The children put the paper pulp onto a frame and pressed out the water. They added glitter, petals and lavender before turning it out onto greaseproof paper to dry.



The children were so excited to feel like they were the experts that they took the challenge by the horns and sat outside in the sun with clipboards and wrote their instructions for the rest of the school. They then showed their writing to the class and talked about what it said and how they had made and decorated their paper.



One of the first things we did was create a wagon outside for the children made out of a piece of foam and a table. Old tyres and pans completed the look.




We also made a role play gold mine, camp fire and saloon inside our classroom.



It began with two children discovering mystery eggs in our outside area. They then gathered both classes to inform them.



An Egg had hatched!!!




Other writing opportunities that developed: Responding to a letter from the T-Rex, creating our own mini dinosaur books, designing and writing about a new dinosaur friend.








The children discovered a strange egg in the playground – They were then shown some CCTV (video) footage of a dinosaur



Dinosaur Topic

We did a fantastic topic on Dinosaurs! At the end of the week before we started our topic, we found an unidentified egg in our outside area that we stumbled upon. With the egg was a letter from the eggs mummy, telling us that she could not look after it and she wanted us to. The children were very excited to watch it grow and hatch. Before it hatched, the children enjoyed writing lists and sentences in our challenge area about what creatures they thought would hatch out of it.



Instructions

After the children had written about what creatures they thought might be in the egg, we had another letter from the eggs mummy with a set of instructions to follow to care for the egg. We put Talk for Writing actions with the instructions to help the children write their own set in the challenge area.



The egg hatched!

Three days after we had followed our given instructions of putting the egg into water, our class dinosaur was born! He hatched out of the egg and our class was quick to name him Classoneosaurus after our class name; Class One. We then began to send home Classoneosaurus each night with one lucky child for them to write a diary about the adventures they went on with him. We have had lots of writing in his diary and pictures that the children have made for him. The children have initiated their own writing by writing cards and messages and drawing him pictures that they then put with him in his bed.



Secret Party Planning..

Our topic was jobs and it also happened to be our two teaching assistants birthdays! The children wanted to make the day special for them, so together we came up with the idea of having a party!



The children were busy typing cards. The more able wrote their own personalised birthday message while the less able focused on practising their typing skills.



Parents donated food and the children wrote labels for it.

We read instructions for decorating a biscuit, then made them for the party. The next week we wrote instructions for decorating biscuits, so that our class Teddy Sam could also make them!


We wrote party invitations to each other.






A great day, enjoyed by all!





