## Revocation of Vaccination as a Condition of Deployment

The Government intends to revoke the regulations making COVID-19 vaccination a condition of deployment for health and social care staff and sought views on this through consultation. The government's <u>response to the consultation</u> has now been published. In the light of consultation, the government is proceeding with revocation and the regulations revoking vaccination as a condition of deployment in all health and social care settings will come into force on Tuesday 15 March 2022.

#### New PPE website launched

Last month, it was <u>announced that following a public consultation, NHS trusts, primary care and adult social care providers will continue to receive COVID-19 PPE free of charge until 31 March 2023</u> or until infection prevention and control (IPC) guidance is withdrawn or significantly amended. This is to ensure staff and their patients are protected as we learn to live with COVID-19.

Following on from the announcement, a new <u>online platform to order personal</u> <u>protective equipment (PPE) in England</u> has been launched to ensure continuity of PPE distribution to frontline health and care staff, and other eligible users.

There is an ongoing migration period from the previous system to the new platform, and from Monday 4 April 2022, all customers will be automatically redirected to the new PPE portal from the previous site. The new platform will be managed by NHS Supply Chain.

### Guidance update for supported living and home care

The guidance for <u>supported living settings</u> has been updated. There is no longer a legal requirement for people with COVID-19 to self-isolate, however the public health advice for people with any of the main symptoms or a positive test result is to stay at home and avoid contact with other people.

Information for those <u>providing personal care to people living in their own home</u> during the coronavirus outbreak has also been revised.

# Guidance update for visiting care homes

Visitors in care homes are not subject to any national restrictions, and care home providers are expected to facilitate visits wherever possible in a risk-managed manner. However, people living in care homes are typically more vulnerable to severe illness because of coronavirus, and while vaccination is proving very effective, there are still some cases of severe illness, hospitalisation and death of care home residents who have been vaccinated.

Additional measures are therefore in place to facilitate visiting while keeping care home staff and residents safe, including:

- stringent infection prevention and control measures,
- individual risk assessments relating to visits,
- safe management of testing arrangements, and
- the need for resident isolation on return from some high-risk activities out of the home.

Providers may still ask visitors to make arrangements in advance of their visit, so the number of people attending at any given time may be managed. If safe visiting practices can be managed, these visits should not be limited in duration, and take place in a room that is most convenient and comfortable for the resident (for example, residents with dementia may be more comfortable in their own room with familiar possessions). When IPC measures are in place, such as visiting in a ventilated area, wearing appropriate PPE for the visit, and washing hands before and after visiting - gloves are not required for handholding and strict hand washing is recommended - physical contact should be able to benefit health and wellbeing.

On the day of their visit, visitors should still receive a negative lateral flow test result and report it either when they conduct the test at home or upon arrival at the care home. Face masks should be worn when visiting a care home, particularly when moving through the care home. COVID-19 spreads through the air by droplets and aerosols that are exhaled from the nose and mouth of an infected person. Face masks reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19, especially when there is close contact between people in enclosed, poorly ventilated, and crowded spaces. It is important that face masks fit securely around the face to safely cover the mouth,

nose and chin. There may be circumstances where face coverings cause distress to residents, and in these situations a comprehensive risk assessment should be carried out so that strategies can be developed to manage those risks.

The guidance for visits out of the care home also remain unchanged, as well as the associated testing expectations. All residents (regardless of vaccination status) should not normally need to self-isolate following a visit out, but a risk assessment should be completed.

The role of the essential caregiver remains unchanged. Caregivers can offer companionship or help with care needs, and can visit even during periods of outbreak, providing they do not have COVID-19. In the exceptional circumstances where someone may need the additional support of more than one essential caregiver, this should be considered, for example, if the nominated essential caregiver is unwell. Essential caregivers should follow the same testing arrangements as staff, both for asymptomatic testing and during an outbreak, and wear PPE and follow IPC guidance as necessary.

Families and residents should be informed of the care home's visiting policy, as well as any necessary adjustments to arrangements.

The vaccination requirement still applies to professionals who enter a care home. The vaccination status of individuals who do not intend to enter the building is not required.

Outbreak control measures remain in place if there are two or more confirmed cases of COVID-19 (or clinically suspected cases) among people within the same setting, with the onset of symptoms within 14 days. This will restrict indoor visiting, but as before, essential caregivers can continue to attend.

# Care home deterioration tool survey

It will help the team to understand which tools are used and how deteriorating residents are identified, and managed, across care homes in England.
