

# The Leicestershire Virtual School Conference 2020

The conference is on 27th FEBRUARY 2020 from 8:30 am - 4:00 pm at King Power Stadium, Filbert Way, Leicester LE2 7FL

#### About the conference:

The new Ofsted framework focuses on the extent to which school "leaders' and managers' high ambitions" include "all pupils, including those who are harder to reach". This conference will look at how your school's vision, ethos and strategic direction can provide the key to "high-quality education for all pupils".

You will hear how your policy impacts on the everyday experience of vulnerable children, especially looked after and previously looked after children and some examples of how changes in practice can lead to fewer exclusions and greater engagement in education from your pupils.

#### **Target audience:**

The conference is aimed at head teachers and other primary and secondary senior leaders; governors; designated teachers for looked after children and other stakeholders with an interest in the education of vulnerable children.

Governors should talk to their school's SLT in order to arrange to attend together and take advantage of the reduced rate for second and subsequent members of the same school (£75.00 first, £55.00 second and subsequent). We have more details of the afternoon session which will feature the 'voice' of young people and their experiences of inclusive practice at school, reflecting on how ethos impacts on pupils' mental health and emotional well-being.

### Apply to be an Independent School Appeal Panel Member for Leicestershire County Council

#### What will I be doing?

Sitting on independent admission appeal panels to consider appeals by parents/carers who have been refused a place for their child at their preferred school.

Considering information provided by the Admission Authority about why a school place has been refused.

Ensuring that parents/carers feel they have had a fair and independent hearing and have been given every opportunity to present their case.

Carefully balancing the arguments with advice from a qualified legal advisor to make a decision on the appeal.

### Writing the date in 2020

Typically when writing the short date, we write dd/mm/yy, but this year could cause a problem. Only writing the year as '20' leaves a potential for fraud because there is space where other digits could be added on. For example, 12/01/20 could have '18' added on, so that it reads 12/01/2018.

Throughout this year, to minimise the risk of fraud, it will be best to use the full year date in any handwritten reports or when signing and dating documents.

### Compare how much your school is spending on agency supply teachers

Schools using our <u>supply teachers and agency workers deal</u> are achieving substantial savings. Using this deal your school can avoid costly temp-to-perm fees, as agencies cannot apply fees for making temporary staff permanent after 12 weeks of working for you (must give 4 weeks' notice).

You can use the department's <u>financial benchmarking service</u> to help you compare how much your school is spending on agency supply staff compared with similar schools

### Multi-million-pound culture boost for children in schools

## **Sport England**

Welcome to the first Active Lives Children and Young People Survey report summarising the activity levels of children and young people (aged 5-16) in England from September 2017 to July 2018.

Given that attitudes towards sport and physical activity are often shaped by experiences in childhood, we have sought to explore and better understand not only the behaviours of children and young people, but also their attitudes towards sport and physical activity, and the extent to which being active links to levels of mental wellbeing, individual development and social and community development.

### Pre-teen girls 'tricked into sex acts on webcams'

Girls aged between 11 and 13 are increasingly being tricked and coerced into performing sexually over their own webcams, data suggests.

The Internet Watch Foundation said 80% of the sexual selfies it found in its relentless trawl for images of child sexual abuse were of children this age.

The charity took action on 37,000 self-generated images of children last year. About 30,000 were of adolescents. Its chief executive said the number of cases was growing at an alarming rate.

This guidance is for school leaders and teachers considering the rationale for character education and personal development, and the practicalities of provision and delivery.

The guidance will support schools as they consider:

the 2019 Ofsted inspection framework

the social, moral, cultural and spiritual development of pupils

preparations for the introduction of 'Relationships education' and 'Health education' in primary schools, and 'Relationships, sex and health education' in secondary schools

The guidance provides schools with 6 benchmarking questions to support reflection and the selfevaluation of current provision.

## Schools encouraged to open up sports facilities all year round

Thousands of children will benefit from more sports activities after school and in the school holidays through a £1.6 million funding boost to help schools make better use of their facilities.

As part of a national drive to encourage 60 minutes of physical activity per day across the week, the Education Secretary Gavin Williamson has announced total funding worth £2.4 million for better sports activities and teaching, including for schools in 19 areas across England to collaborate with sports organisations to increase the opportunities to use school sports facilities outside the school day.

The Active Partnership Network, supported by Sport England, will set up partnerships between schools and local sport providers, encouraging them to open up their sport facilities for fun and engaging sporting competitions, after school clubs and holiday activities.

## Chief Inspector warns against pursuing success without substance

This year's annual report finds the overall quality of education and care in England is good and improving, but chief inspector warns against complacency.

Launching her third Annual Report as Her Majesty's Chief Inspector, Amanda Spielman said today that the great majority of schools, colleges, nurseries and child minders in England are good or outstanding, reflecting the hard work of teachers, leaders and support staff who work there.

86% of schools are judged to be good or outstanding 96% of early years (EY) providers are good or outstanding

81% of inspected further education and skills (FES) providers are good or outstanding

In Ofsted chief inspector Amanda Spielman's annual report, published today, the regulator said it identified weaknesses in joint commissioning for SEND.

Added references to specify if policies also apply to maintained or non-maintained nursery schools. Updated 'Register of business interests of headteachers and governors' section to reference that it is a live document. Updated 'Capability of staff' section to reflect that academies can set their own terms for approval.
